Labour Force Survey Basics

- Survey started in 1960. Data published monthly since 1977
- Like voting, it is mandatory to participate if chosen
- 1 in 340 people in Australia are in the sample each month
- Participants are all over Australia (1 in 445 people in NSW, to 1 in 52 in the NT)
- Around 25,000 households provide information on 50,000 people each month
- People are surveyed monthly for an eight (8) month period. 80% of the people are the same one month to the next with 1/8 of the sample is replaced by new households each month
- Most respond online or over the phone. Small number of face-to-face interviews



- The 507, 000 unemployed people include the whole population 15 years and over but are actively available and looking for work.
- There are more people not working, but they are not available/looking for work.
- Non-participation are unemployed & looking, retired, taking time out for Parental Leave etc.
- 1 hour or more is considered "employed".


Current Stats

In June 2023:

- employment increased by 39,000 people
- unemployed people decreased by 1,600




What's happening with Employment




Large month-to-month changes occurred during the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting in multiple trend breaks. The ABS recommends caution when using trend estimates published in spreadsheets in this release for this period. What's happening with **Unemployment**





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What's happening with **Under**employment

Of the 14.1 million employed people in May 2023, 1,594,400 were underemployed.

Of these:

•1,424,800 people preferred more hours 585,200 were employed full-time 839,600 employed part-time.


There were 127,400 people who were in both categories - they had their hours reduced to less than usual and also preferred to work more than usual hours.

What's happening with Hours Worked




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What's happening with Hours Worked




Job Vacancies



Businesses reporting Job Vacancies




Elevated Job Vacancies
